

## A Place of Worship

There has been a place of worship on this site since Saxon times.

Each Sunday we hold services, using either the old Book of Common Prayer or the new Common Worship form. On the second Sunday of the month our 10.00 a.m. service is *Something Different* though sometimes the Sunday could change for this service. It is usually a less formal, non-communion service and will frequently involve a visiting speaker, and could be somewhere other than in church.

## An Open Door

Saint Peter's is open each day to receive the many people who come to look around, or simply to be still in the peaceful surroundings. The open door is a symbol of God's constant readiness to receive us. Please come and share in our services, which seek to give glory to God.

## Membership

You are able to apply for membership of the Church's electoral roll after you have worshipped here regularly for a period of at least six months.

## Children and Young People

During term-time, on the fourth Sunday of the month, there is a Sunday Club for children (**Fisherfolk**) between the ages of approximately three and twelve years. There is a small carpeted area in the Lady Chapel with toys and books, for very young children, who are always most welcome.

Also on the fourth Sunday of the month, there is a short service for families with young children from both Hascombe and Dunsfold, Funday@4pm, held in Saint Mary and All Saints Church in Dunsfold, which is followed by tea.

## The Vestry Extension

The new recently built vestry extension, gives some much needed extra room and is used for meetings and children's activities, and provides a loo and disabled access.

After the services, coffee is served in the vestry to give people the opportunity of talking to the clergy and getting to know one another.

## Parking

The White Horse pub kindly allows us to use the car park for services on Sundays. Parking is not allowed in Church Road because of its narrowness and its use by horseboxes. Special parking arrangements must be made for weddings.

## The Church Family

Saint Peter's is home to all those who wish to worship here and all denominations are welcome. We share our priest with the neighbouring village of Dunsfold, where he lives, so services will not always be taken by him.

The choir practises each Thursday at 7.15 p.m. and new members are most welcome. As well as singing for the church services, the choir has, in the past, entered the Godalming Music Festival.

David Jopson (01483 429962) is choirmaster.

Help with flowers is always needed, particularly for the festivals at Christmas and Easter, the Patronal Festival in June, and Harvest.

Hilary Austin (01483 422543) will help to get you started.

Bell ringers are welcome – beginners or those with experience. In addition to ringing before the church services, experienced bell ringers are often needed for weddings.

Captain of the Bell Tower is Sue Evans (01483 208405).

## A Place of Beauty

Saint Peter's Church was rebuilt in 1864, when Canon Musgrave was the Rector of Hascombe, and who provided much of the money needed for the building himself (£3,100). The church was designed by the architect, Henry Woodyer and incorporates some of the items from the original Saxon church, such as the medieval wooden screen, and the 17th century font. The stained glass windows, the splays surrounding them and the spandrels above them, portray biblical scenes involving angels. In the chancel the episodes start on the north side with the expulsion of Adam and Eve from the Garden of Eden and continue with Old Testament stories until the last small spandrel on the south side shows the Archangel Gabriel appearing to Zaccharias. The wall paintings, including the "miracle of the fishes" in the nave, were cleaned and restored in the 1980s. Leaflets giving a brief history of the church and a book describing the paintings can be found at the back of the church. There is also a very informative guide to the churches in both Hascombe and Dunsfold, costing £10.00.
